

Childrens Book Review

A Beetle is Shy by Dianna Hutts Aston

Published in 2016, A Beetle is Shy is the sixth instalment in a set of nature books written by Dianna Hutts Aston and illustrated by Sylvia Long. Other books in the series include A Seed is Sleepy, A Butterfly is Patient, and An Egg is Quiet. Replete with rich vocabulary, vivid illustrations, and intriguing facts, this book is right on par with the other books in the series.

My second grade students were most impressed to learn that a ladybug is a type of beetle. They were most disgusted to learn that beetles are eaten by humans all around the world! We used this book as a mentor text for writing about nature, but I could also see myself using it to teach a minilesson about text features or main idea and details. The main idea of each page is written in cursive, followed by supporting details written in nonscript font. If your school has stopped teaching cursive handwriting, this book serves as a reminder that students must at least know how to read cursive!


While this book contains no actual photographs of beetles, the beautiful illustrations capture the attention of even the insect-leery. I always like to remind my students that art and science might seem like totally different subjects, but for some illustrators they go hand-in-hand. This would be a good book to pull into science class when studying insects. It would be a good book to pull into art when teaching symmetry. Most importantly, it would be a good book to read aloud just for fun!



Professional Book Review

The Resilience Breakthrough by Christian Moore

Christian Moore realized his dream of becoming a social worker by transforming his anger, pain, and frustration into fierce determination. As a student with severe learning disabilities and a child of a blended family of twelve living in poverty in Washington, D.C., he had to devise a plan for success. His plan for graduating college relied on his personal support system, the "No F Game Plan" and the "Extra Credit Hustle". For four long years he had mastered every academic challenge and met each financial demand, but on the last day of his senior year of college he was forced to face his worse fear. He used his disabilities as motivation to fight his way to that degree and in doing so Christian realized that the lowest point of his life could be converted into his greatest lesson

in resilience. His message to the world is "you can transform your pain into power; convert your adversity into powerful fuel that brings you opportunity".

Mr. Moore shares his personal and professional experiences to show you, regardless of your race, education level, or socioeconomic status, how to use his twenty-seven tools for turning adversity into action. Armed with the knowledge and understanding of the core principles of resilience and the four main sources of resilience: relational resilience, street resilience, resource resilience and rock bottom resilience, you are able to tap into your emotional fuel and turn it into resilience.

It's easy to get started; the first step is realizing you have a switch then learning how to flip your switch. "Flipping the Switch" is a continuous process. To find out which source of resilience you are strongest in, Mr. Moore encourages you to take the resilience self-assessment. At the end of each part of the book, you will record your response to an "Ask" question and a "Task" request. In addition, you are

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asked to identify emotions and mindsets that relate to the previous discussed source of resilience to increase your capacity to access that source.

If you're willing to be fearless and accept Mr. Moore's promise that his book will propel you towards a life of hope and an ability to thrive then you will have the opportunity to share his message with the children and adults in your world.
